Ongoing & future focus

- ✓ Complete Commission Implementing Regulations
 - National measures under Article 226 of the AHL
 - Amendment of IR 2018/1882 (listed species)
 - Exemptions from registration and record-keeping
 - Certificates 2 separate Regulations for aquatics (10 new certificates)
- ✓ Amendment of certain Commission Delegated Regulations
 - Several but those relevant to aquatics are Regulations 2020/689 and 2020/692
- ✓ Training, supporting documents
 - Delays due to Covid -19
 - Communication phase CAs & stakeholders
 - Better Training for Safer Food





Disease listing (finfish) Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2018/1629 (amending Annex II of the AHL)

- Epizootic haematopoietic necrosis (EHN)
- Viral haemorrhagic septicaemia (VHS)
- Infectious haematopoietic necrosis (IHN)
- Infection with HPR- deleted ISAV
- Koi herpes virus (KHV)

- Infection with Taura Syndrome virus

Commission Implementing Regulation (EU) 2018/1882

- 1. 'Cat A' approximates to 'exotic' under Dir 2006/88/EC
- 2. 'Cat C' approximates to 'non-exotic' under Dir 2006/88/EC
- KHV 'non-exotic' under Dir 2006/88/EC but 'Cat E' under CIR (EU) 2018/1882
 'diseases for which there is a need for surveillance' MS can take national measures under Article 226 (AHL)

Cat A

Diseases that do not normally occur in the Union and for which immediate eradication measures must be taken

Cat C

Diseases which are of relevance to some Member States and which are subject to optional eradication

A226

Similar to Article 43 of Dir 2006/88- 'national measures' - diseases which constitute a significant risk in a particular MS

Food Safety



Surveillance, eradication programmes, disease freedom

- Notification of suspicion of presence of listed and emerging diseases required in all cases
- Investigation of abnormal mortalities & other signs of serious disease or significant decreased production rates with an undetermined cause- required in all cases
- 3. Risk based surveillance required in certain approved establishments
 - simplified approach
 - set out details of risk factors to be taken into account when categorising establishments
 - high', 'medium' or 'low' risk
 - 4. Disease-freedom may be achieved at MS/zone/compartment level
 - a number of pathways set out
 - comprehensive rules for eradication programmes



Surveillance, eradication programmes, disease freedom

- Existing 'CAT III' farms which are not known to be infected but not in a programme to gain freedom provided for in Directive 2006/88/EC
- <u>BUT</u> after more than a decade.... > 80% of APBs growing finfish throughout the EU are currently in this category – <u>significant problem</u>
- This category has not been replicated under the new Delegated Regulations
- Surveillance programmes instead carried out at establishment level and voluntary – once in the programme, testing must be carried out by the CA in accordance with the legislation

Disease control measures

- ✓ Set out in detail for **Category A diseases** measures to be taken by operators and competent authorities
 - √ on suspicion
 - ✓ on confirmation
- ✓ Cross references to control measures for Category B & C diseases which are set out in Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/689



Registration and approval of establishments

- ✓ Basic requirement for aquaculture establishments is registration but certain higher risk aquaculture establishments need to be approved
- ✓ Derogations from the requirement for approval for certain establishments are set out in Regulation (EU) 2016/ 429 and in Regulation (EU) 2020/691 e.g those producing small quantities for direct consumption/ local markets; P&Ts; closed ornamental; solely for release into the wild; extensive ponds....... when the risk they pose is insignificant
- ✓ AHL and DA set out requirements for operators of registered establishments e.g. notification, investigation, basic record keeping
- ✓ AHL and DA set out requirements for operators of approved establishments e.g. notification, investigation, record keeping, biosecurity measures, facilities & equipment, in certain cases participation in an RBS scheme

Food Safety



Specific requirements for approval

Requirements depend on the type of establishment but in general, will include at least two of the following:

- Risk based surveillance
- Biosecurity measures
- Facilities and equipment





Risk based surveillance proposal

- ✓ Applies to certain approved establishments
- ✓ Applies to those keeping listed species for Cat C diseases which the CA has categorised as 'high', 'medium' or 'low' risk
- ✓ Applies to those keeping
 - √ non-listed species for Cat C diseases or
 - ✓ species listed as vectors of Cat C diseases in Implementing Regulation 2018/1882 but which have not been in contact with listed susceptible species

which the CA has categorised as 'high' risk

- ✓ See this as a more targeted application of RBS than that set out in Directive 2006/88/EC and more suitable for detection of emerging diseases
- ✓ Many aquaculture establishments in the EU keep species which are currently not listed (e.g. sea bass and sea bream) =>proposed that RBS will apply only to the **high risk** establishments growing 16 those species



Registers of establishments & record keeping

- The CA must keep registers containing certain information which relates to registered and approved establishments.
 Operators of approved establishments will be included in an inter-net based information page which is publicly available
- Operators including transporters must keep records which will include the requirements set out in the AHL and supplemented by the requirements set out in Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/691 – traceability / proof of biosecurity measures etc
- => similar to the requirements in Dir 2006/88/EC



Movements of aquatic animals and products within the Union

- Rules for movements of aquatic animals within the EU are broadly similar to those set out in Directive 2006/88/EC
 - OVERALL: Movements shall not jeopardise the health status at the place of destination with regard to listed or emerging diseases
- New requirement for self declaration documents for movements between Member States in cases where certification is not required
- Self declaration documents relating to surveillance programmes will have relevant health attestations i.e. date and result from last test



Entry into the EU

- Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/692 -largely reflective of current aquatic legislation but covers only listed species for the listed diseases.
- Associated Implementing Acts
- 1. List of third countries

Amendment of Implementing Regulation (EU) 2018/1882

- EURL convened 2 expert groups Fish & Crustaceans
- Review of species list (susceptible and vector)
- Report provided to EU Commission early September
- Amendment to CIR (EU) 2018/1882 in preparation
- Takes account of deliberations of OIE ad hoc groups
- Risk management step Member States & EU Commission
- Ready for date of application of AHL





Annex VI of Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/689

- Largely based on Implementing Decision (EU)2015/1554 but some differences.....
 - Part I= Risk-based surveillance
 - General approach
 - Risk ranking of establishments
 - Frequency of risk-based animal health visits
 - Part II = Disease specific requirements for disease free status =>Chapters for VHS/IHN, Infection with HPR-deleted ISAV, Infection with WSSV
 - General requirements for health visits and sampling
 - Granting disease-free status when initial health status is 'unknown'
 - Granting disease-free status when initial health status is 'infected'
 - Maintaining disease-free status
 - Diagnostic and sampling methods



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- Some significant differences however....
 - Detailed diagnostic methods and procedures currently set out in Annex II to 2015/1554 are <u>not</u> included in Annex VI. From 21 April 2021, these will instead be available on EURL website.
 - Part III of Annex VI: Surveillance programme for Category C diseases (new)
 - General requirements for health visits
 - Requirements to demonstrate the implementation of a surveillance programme
 - Requirements to re-start a surveillance programme after a disease outbreak
 - Similar to requirements to maintain freedom
